ML: Oh, really? I tried doing French at Wits Language School.

JD: That's where I'm doing it! I do two courses, one at Wits and the other at Wits Language School.

ML: We would go to class on a Saturday morning, but my brother and I would go out on the Friday night, and then it became a total disaster. Ja, so I've got the basics: 'Bonjour, ça va, trés bien, je m'appelle Mojak.' I learnt how to count up
